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richly illustrated and featuring detailed descriptions of works by pivotal figures in the italian renaissance this enlightening volume traces the development of art and architecture throughout the italian peninsula in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries a smart elegant and jargon free analysis of the italian renaissance what it was what it means and why we should study it provides a sustained discussion of many great works of renaissance art that will significantly enhance readers understanding of the period focuses on renaissance art and architecture as it developed throughout the italian peninsula from venice to sicily situates the italian renaissance in the wider context of the history of art includes detailed interpretation of

works by a host of pivotal renaissance artists both well and lesser known

the chronology of the italian renaissance its character and context have long been a topic of discussion among scholars some date its beginnings to the fourteenth century work of giotto others to the generation of masaccio brunelleschi and donatello that flourished from around 1400 the close of the renaissance has also proved elusive mannerism for example is variously considered to be an independent but subsidiary late aspect of renaissance style or a distinct style in its own right

renaissance art history is traditionally identified with italian centers of production and florence in particular instead this book explores the dynamic interchange between european artistic centers and artists and the trade in works of art it also considers the impact of differing locations on art and artists and some of the economic political and cultural factors crucial to the emergence of an artistic center during c 1420 1520 no city or court could succeed in isolation and so artists operated within a network of interests and local and international identities the case studies presented in this book portray the renaissance as an exciting international phenomenon with cities and courts inextricably bound together in a web of economic and political interests

this book gives the necessary background for the study and appreciation of italian painting and sculpture from about 1250 to 1550 it tells how the artists learned their craft the organization of their workshops and the guilds they belonged to how their customers or patrons treated them and where their work was displayed churches civic buildings or private homes the book discusses how art was made tempera oil panel canvas fresco it surveys the characteristic types of renaissance art altarpieces portraits tombs busts doors fountains medals etc

many famous artworks of the italian renaissance were made to celebrate love marriage and family they were the pinnacles of a tradition dating from early in the era of commemorating betrothals marriages and the birth of children by commissioning extraordinary objects maiolica glassware jewels textiles paintings that were often also exchanged as gifts this volume is the first comprehensive survey of artworks arising from renaissance rituals of love and marriage and makes a major contribution to our understanding of renaissance art in its broader cultural context the impressive range of works gathered in these pages extends from birth trays painted in the early fifteenth century to large canvases on mythological themes that titian painted in the mid 1500s each work of art would have been recognized by contemporary viewers for its prescribed function within the private domestic domain book jacket

offers vivid accounts of the lives and personalities of four popes each a great patron of art and architecture julius ii leo x clement vii and paul iii he also tells of the complicated rebuilding and expanding of st peter s a project in which bramante raphael and michelangelo all took part having set the historical scene hersey then explores the vatican s magnificent renaissance art and architecture in separate chapters organized spatially he leads the reader through the cortile del belvedere and vatican museums with their impressive holdings of statuary and paintings the richly decorated stanze and logge of raphael and michelangelo s last judgment and newly cleaned sistine chapel ceiling a fascinating final chapter entitled the tragedy of the tomb recounts the vicissitudes of michelangelo s projected funeral monument to julius ii hersey is never content to simply identify the subject of a painting or sculpture he gives us the story behind the works telling us what their particular themes signified at the time for the artist the papacy and the church he also indicates how the art was received by contemporaries and viewed by later generations generously illustrated and complete with a useful chronology high renaissance art in st peter s and the vatican is a valuable reference for any traveler to rome or lover of italian art who has yearned for a single volume work more informative and stimulating than ordinary guidebooks at the same time hersey s many anecdotes and intriguing comparisons with works outside the vatican will provide new insights even for specialists

this title was first published in 2000 michelangelo gave his painting of leda and the swan to an apprentice rather than hand it over to the emissary of the duke of ferrara who had commissioned it he was apparently disgusted by the failure of the emissary who was probably more used to buying pigs than discussing art to accord the picture and the artist the value they deserved any discussion of works of art and material culture implicitly assigns them a set of values whether these values be monetary cultural or religious they tend to constrict the ways in which such works can be discussed the variety of potential forms of valuation becomes particularly apparent during the italian renaissance when relations between the visual arts and humanistic studies were undergoing rapid changes against an equally fluid social economic and political background in this volume 13 scholars explicitly examine some of the complex ways in which a variety of values might be associated with italian renaissance material culture papers range from a consideration of the basic values of the materials employed by artists to the manifestation of cultural values in attitudes to dress and domestic devotion by illuminating some of the ways in which values were constructed they provide a broader context within which to evaluate renaissance material culture

a leading art historian s plea for a more engaged reading of italian renaissance art only connect constructs a history of renaissance paintings and sculptures that are by design completed outside themselves by the spectator that draw the spectator into their narrative plot or aesthetic functioning and that reposition the spectator imaginatively or in time and space john shearman s concern is mostly with anterior relationships with the viewer that is relationships conceived and constructed

as part of a work's design making and positioning he proposes unconventional ways in which works of art may be distinguished from one another and in which spectators may be distinguished as well and enlarges the accepted field of artistic invention only connect challenges us to recognize the presuppositions of renaissance artists about their viewers shining a light on the process of discovery by some of the most inventive and intellectual artists of the period

This survey of Italian Renaissance art from a new and different perspective shows how art was a vital part of society and how all types of art and artists reflected the needs and aspirations of the culture from which they arose. Most books on Renaissance art are based on a chronological study of the major artists and their works. In this book, Bruce Cole covers the major types of art from c. 1250 to c. 1550, discusses their origins and development, documents their use and function, and describes their form and how and why the artists shaped them. That way art is thus firmly connected with the life and society of the Renaissance rather than viewed as a separate entity. Painting and sculpture are seen in their proper context after a wide-ranging introduction. There are chapters on Italian Renaissance art in relation to domestic life, worship, civic life, death, and afterlife, and Renaissance images and ideals.

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
